SCOPE AND OBJECTIVES

The ICOMOS General Assembly in Mexico in October 1999 approved finally the ICOMOS International Cultural Tourism Charter and replaced the ICOMOS Cultural Tourism Charter of 1976. Recently, the ICOMOS International Cultural Tourism Committee (ICTC) had to revise the charter intensively to keep pace with the latest standards, best practices and principles within the relationship between tourism and places or collections of significant cultural heritage. Since its last edition in 1999, there have been a number of significant developments. The Convention for the Protection of Intangible Cultural Heritage and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Deceptor, as well as the introduction of the Sustainable

Indigenous Peoples, as well as the introduction of the Sustainable Development Goals and the proclamation of the International Year of Sustainable Development in Tourism in 2017 by the United Nations changed the general perspectives.

Now the document addresses the climate emergency, the exponential growth of tourism and visitors to cultural sites, and the varying impacts over the last twenty years. The perspective has changed into rightsbased and people-centered approaches to cultural heritage and its enjoyment. The Heritage Commons perspective and its participatory governance promote a new vision of heritage tourism that aims to avoid its ongoing commercial exploitation and promote the equitable and inclusive distribution of its positive impacts.



Within the international conservation framework established by ICOMOS, the Charter addresses the primary relationships between the cultural identity and heritage of the host community and the interests, expectations and behaviors of visitors at home and abroad. It promotes the engagement of the host community, including indigenous and traditional custodians, in all aspects of tourism planning and management, particularly at heritage sites, cultural landscapes and historic cities.

The General Assembly of ICOMOS in Bangkok 2022 approved the revised version and launched it officially on January 16th 2023 in the official ICOMOS languages English, French and Spanish. Already within the year 2023, intensive collaboration with the respective national committees produced official versions in Italian, Chinese, Arabic and Danish.

Now the time is ready for another workshop with the goal to develop a rough version for German and other languages depending on the participant's origin (Slovenia, Hungary, Albania is on schedule). With the support of the BMKOES translation services, this rough German version should lead to a fine-tuned, official version in Austrian-German launched as download via the International ICOMOS site, and published as brochure.

Within the international workshop and summer school, taking place from Juli 1st to July 7st 2024, and hosted by ICOMOS Austria, Celia Martinez (ICTC, Member of the Board of ICOMOS) will present the background to the charter's creation. Experienced ICOMOS experts from Austria, Estonia, Germany and Switzerland will then prepare the workshop participants for further discussion and lead through the process of its translation into the before mentioned languages. Parallel, ICOMOS Slovenia will start its annual summer school in cooperation with the University of Ljubljana. For the first 2 days during the mornings, via zoom-conferences from the two venues, the thematically mixed lectures are held together. In the afternoons, at each venue the workshop and summer school will work according to their own agenda.



Field trips to and case studies within the UNESCO World Heritage Sites in Vienna (Historic City Center of Vienna, Castle of Schönbrunn) and the UNESCO Cultural Heritage Landscape Wachau will be used to observe cultural heritage tourism in its current tendency towards "overtourism". On the contrary, the workshop location, an abandoned baroque monastery, and its surroundings with a great variety in other cultural heritage sites, still suffers massive "undertourism". The studies at site after discussing the charter will allow a wider picture of contemporary cultural heritage tourism.

Guided tour through the following UNESCO World Heritage Sites

Palaces and Gardens of Schönbrunn (listed 1996):

From the 18th century to 1918, Schönbrunn was the residence of the Habsburg emperors. It was designed by the architects Johann Bernhard Fischer von Erlach and Nicolaus Pacassi and is full of outstanding examples of decorative art. Together with its gardens, the site of the world's first zoo in 1752, it is a remarkable Baroque ensemble and a perfect example of *Gesamtkunstwerk*.

Wachau Cultural Landscape (listed 2000)

The Wachau is a stretch of the Danube Valley between Melk and Krems, a landscape of high visual quality. It preserves in an intact and visible form many traces - in terms of architecture, (monasteries, castles, ruins), urban design, (towns and villages), and agricultural use, principally for the cultivation of vines - of its evolution since prehistoric times.

Historic Centre of Vienna (listed 2001, Endangered 2017)

Vienna developed from early Celtic and Roman settlements into a Medieval and Baroque city, the capital of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. It played an essential role as a leading European music centre, from the great age of Viennese Classicism through the early part of the 20th century. The historic centre of Vienna is rich in architectural ensembles, including Baroque castles and gardens, as well as the late-19th-century Ringstrasse lined with grand buildings, monuments and parks.

Special Tour through the not-recognized Cultural Landscape Traisental in Lower Austria

The Traisental is a manifold cultural landscape, totally underestimated.

It contains several smaller baroque and even older castles (Freundorf, Jeutendorf, Wasserburg, Walpersdorf, Sizendorf-Reiding), all still in private property, and struggling with rehabilitation and adaptive reuse. Currently two of them are masterthesis topics at TU-Vienna, so we will get into closer contact with the owners and the planners of future scenarios. The venue of the workshop is another baroque monastery with fabulous murals from the most prominent baroque painters. It served as dormitory for priests in education, contains remains of an exhibition on baroque art and is without use nowadays, if ICOMOS Austria would not use it from time to time for special seminaries.

The big and rich monasteries of Wachau like Göttweig or Melk still do hold their agricultural estates within the Traisental, built castle-like and within the baroque period. Some of them like Paudorf, Meidling im Tal and Anzenhof we at least can sneak by and see from the outside.

In the vicinity of the workshop venue, within walking distance, are several traditional wine-producing villages with its typical, partial underground cellars("Kellergassen"), which ICOMOS Austria considers of World Heritage Nomination Potential for not-yet nominated vernacular architecture.

Last but not least, the valley of the river Traisen served coal mining purposes in the times between World War I and World War II. The physical remains including the narrow gorge railway system still is partially visible, including its administrative and social structures.



LECTURES AND WORKSHOP

The workshop in principal addresses all German speaking ICOMOS members, but in particular ICOMOS EP's and university students of achitecture, archaeology, history, history of art, structural engineering, landscape architecture, spatial planning, urban planning. It is an activity of the ICOMOS UNIVERSITY FORUM.

Therefore, the **language of the workshop and summer school will be English**. Hence, for matters of the draft-translation of the charter in various other languages (German, Hungarian, Albanian ...), the organizers recommend at least a double language knowledge f.e. **English-German**.

TU-Wien students within the master program of architecture may complete with the workshop and summer school a special **MODULE of CULTURAL SPACES** (coordinator and examiner: Dr. Ulrike Herbig). PhD students may complement individually their **doctoral science studies** in architecture with specialization on history of architecture, monument protection and preservation of cultural heritage (coordinator and examiner: Prof. Dr. Caroline Jaeger-Klein).

Therefore the organizers carefully calculated the following academic curriculum (next page).

The calculation of the contact hours includes the **obligatory attendance at all lectures, excursions and field trips** as well as active involvement in the workshop discussions and the translation of the charter. Before the end of the summer term (September 31st 2024), the video-film as well as the report-paper has to be handed over to the examiners. The video films will be presented publicly within the frame of another joint TU-Wien/ICOMOS event, probably in September.
